
revealed His plan for her. Marilyn shared this with her husband and then with three friends. They all responded enthusiastically and pledged their prayers and support.

Marilyn's vision became a reality in June, 1981, when the Alpine Board of Camping unanimously gave her authorization to start the organization — Alpine Angels. The specific purpose of the Angels is to support the work of the Alpine Covenant Conference Center. This support group or auxiliary has a vital purpose in assisting the function of bringing people of all ages into a strong Christian

environment. Dedicated Christians were enlisted. These people had also experienced what God does through a camping experience at Alpine. From this group the founding Board of Alpine Angels came into being as well as a network of liaisons to Covenant Churches in Southern California and Arizona.

A membership campaign was started that resulted in almost 400 people signing up!

What a start! Support was genuine and enthusiastic. On page four of this newsletter you can find out how to be an Alpine Angel. The membership is from all over the United States, however it is mainly in Southern California and Arizona, which is the area served by Alpine Covenant Conference Center.

In July of 1981 a building was made available for the thrift store and on August 10, 1981, at noon, Sid Kullberg, Business Manager of the Pacific Southwest Conference of Evangelical Covenant Churches, cut the ribbon and the store was officially open for business!



During the store's first year of operation there has been a steady increase in the amount of business. Seasonal situations cause a fluctuation and certain times of the month are busier than others. Some customers stop by daily and others frequent the store weekly or when doing their shopping nearby. Most customers stop by only occassionally -- whenever anyone enters the store there is always a warm and friendly welcome extended!


IT'S WORTH IT!

As the thrift is received at the Attic it must be sorted and prepared for sale. A bag or box received at the store may contain a variety of items: kitchen items, clothes, shoes, garden tools, home repair items, a camera or jewelery. Some seasonal items are set aside for later sale. If items are received that have no market or are perhaps a bit too worn to really be a good sale item they are either passed along to other charitable organizations that do need those items or, as in the case of clothing, volunteers may convert them into rags, which are in very high demand and sell at a good price.
