

influential week of my life. I was having a lot of doubts about God. I was mad at Him, and turned my back to Him. I was in a dark and scary place, and was anxious about the topic for that year, **Emerge**. I didn't want to talk about my past or bring God into it. But the topic was no coincidence, it was God's way of changing my life.

One night during camp that week, I experienced what I call a miracle. God showed himself to me in a big and visible way. During chapel that night, I had a growing sense of anxiety. It was so strong that I spiraled into a panic attack. My youth pastor tried to calm me down, but nothing was working. Finally he put his hands on my shoulders and prayed. He

called on the name of God to remove the spirit of anxiety imprisoning me. He prayed in that moment for God to give me breath again. He prayed that God would show himself to me by healing me from the attack. The next thing I know, I was calm again. I could breathe, and my pounding heart settle<mark>d</mark>. The res<mark>t</mark> of the night I was more joyful than I've ever **been.** I knew God had to be real, He showed Himself to me in a way that He knew I would notice and would be personal to me.

Ever since my encounter with God at Alpine, I've grown closer and closer to Him. I praise Him for showing Himself to me and giving me so much grace. I even went to camp the next year, and it was another influential week of camp where God revealed himse<mark>lf</mark> yet again<mark> t</mark>o me. God showed Himself to me through counselors, Alpine staff, and the entire camp itself. God even repeated the miracle and revealed himself to me again i<mark>n</mark> the midst of another anxiety attack. Months and months worth of prayer came true at Alpine, and it was such an amazing experience.

Alpine and its staff has changed my life in so many ways, and I cannot thank them enough. If I hadn't gone to Alpine and met God in a very real way, I don't <mark>kn</mark>ow whe<mark>re</mark> I'd be today. I think about Alpine every day, and I thank God for using Alpine to change my life. When I grow up, I want to work at Alpine and give back to them for all they've done.

And it Happened on the Prayer Trail...

here are sacred spaces. Places where God's presence is keenly felt. The Alpine Trail has become such a place.

The idea for the trail came out of a 2007 camping seminar which Bob Hill and Ken Polson attended. Ken is Alpine's Facilities Manager, and Bob was on his team at the time. They were impressed with the thought that the facilities department could have a direct impact on the spiritual formation of campers by providing intentional spaces for reflection in nature. We certainly have an abundance of nature in Alpine's corner of the forest, and thus, the idea of an Alpine Trail was born.

The trail was laid out by Ken, Bob and Joel, with prayer stations along the way featuring the most unique features of the terrain. Then in the spring of 2008, a missions team from In Christ Alone (a campus ministry at USC) volunteered the mornings of their 22-day training camp at Alpine. Under Ken's and Bob's direction, they cut the trail into the hillside, installed erosion controls and trimmed back the trees. That year Joel walked the trail often, praying over the writing of the prayer guide.

On a Sunday morning of a men's retreat, one man came to Joel with his own experience on the prayer trail. "For three years, one of my best friends and I had not spoken due to a past conflict. While on the prayer trail we ended up standing next to each other at the last station. We looked at each other and agreed that we needed to talk. We stayed behind as the group went down to breakfast and reconciled our relationship. **It was the time on the trail, stopping at the stations, pausing long enough in God's presence and each other's presence, that brought us to a place of mutual forgiveness. On this prayer trail, I got my friend back.**"

When guiding a group through the trail, by station three the facilitator knows the group is usually ready to open up to share with each other. Station three of the prayer quide recommends the reading of Psalm 23. During a women's retreat, one woman resonated with the "valley of the shadow of death" section of the Psalm. She shared about her grief over her husband's death. Women gathered around her with hugs and affirmation as she spoke. They prayed for her. Then another woman shared about her pain... same response. That went on for several rounds of women sharing and continued throughout the rest of the stations of the trail. Women who were strangers at the trailhead became sisters along the way.

Camp is full of sacred spaces. The Alpine Trail continues to be a place set apart to make room for experiencing God. Shalom.

ords are essential to the 'Echoes', the Alpine newsletter. Early issues included a sketch of a person sounding an alpenhorn atop a mountain, calling attention to something of value. Words of value spoken on this mountain have reverberated through various valleys for six decades.

Hiking through the forest this morning, I asked Jesus how to say farewell in my final S'more Thoughts. A scripture passage came to mind: Isaiah 55:10-11. "...so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire..." Perfect for this purpose. Then I read on. Isaiah 55:12 was the theme verse for my very first summer as a full-time program director in 1985: "You will go out in joy and be led forth in peace; the mountains and hills will burst into song before you..." Wow.
